RESIDENT PROFILE: Finding a New Home and a Brighter Future at Twin Pines

Eric Williams, now a resident of Twin Pines' new apartment building at 747 Hartford Avenue, has a story defined by resilience. Eric's journey to the Upper Valley has been filled with hardship, setbacks, and ultimately, a chance for a new start.

Eric left home under difficult circumstances. "I didn't have a good relationship with my family," he recalls. "When I was 13 I was placed in a drug rehab program, and when I was 17 I got my emancipation papers that basically set me free from my family. I was free, sure – but with no support, no job, and no real education, I was also homeless. I remember thinking, 'Wow, this is real; this is intense.""

Despite these challenges, Eric took charge of his future. "I decided to go back to school on my own and got my GED," he says. "I was even working toward an Associate's Degree." Eric supported himself through various jobs



across Connecticut, Maine, and eventually Vermont, where he built a long and physically demanding career as an arborist, climbing trees every day. After 27 years of climbing, the wear and tear of Eric's work as an arborist finally caught up with him. "I used to be ripped, in great shape – but now it's different," he reflects. Years of intense physical labor led to serious issues with his knees, back, and hip, impacting his mobility and ultimately forcing him to leave the job he loved.

When he could no longer work as an arborist, Eric's situation became more precarious. He lost his housing and had to rely on friends who, though supportive, couldn't offer a long-term solution. At one point, he was forced to live in the woods, where he survived day-today while holding onto his independence. "I had a job even while I was living in the woods," Eric shares. "I also managed to quit smoking cigarettes, which I'm really proud of. It's been three years now."

After spending over a month at the Upper Valley Haven, Eric was introduced to the possibility of moving into Twin Pines Housing. "I didn't even know this place was an option," he says. "The folks at the Haven suggested it to me, and I'm lucky it worked out. This apartment has been a huge change."

Since moving in, Eric has found stability that has allowed him to focus on his personal growth. "Being here in my own unit, I can deal with my own issues and think about the future," he says. "I'd like to go back to college and finally finish my Associate's Degree." He speaks warmly of his new neighbors, saying, "They're pretty cool. I've met people who aren't angry or withdrawn, which is kind of rare. We even had a Thanksgiving potluck."

Twin Pines and Kilton Library: BUILDING COMMUNITY, ONE STORY AT A TIME



Twin Pines Housing has partnered with Kilton Library in West Lebanon, NH, to create a vibrant community program for children and families at the Village at Crafts Hill. Every Wednesday afternoon, Outreach and Programming Librarian Celeste Pfeiffer and her team transform the community room into a lively space filled with stories, games, and activities. Now in its second year, this program has become a source of connection and joy for children and their families.

"We read stories to the kids, bring in books, and make the library come alive for them," says Celeste. "It's a program they look forward to, simply for the fun of being there." Over time, the gathering has fostered friendships among the children and a real sense of community. "We've created a place where kids introduce themselves to each other and connect week after week."

Kilton Library's partnership with Twin Pines goes beyond books. Collaborating with organizations like Waypoint, Upper Valley Music Center, and Artistree, Kilton Library offers a range of activities to enrich the experience. "Together, we blend resources and ideas to make each program special," Celeste explains.

In addition to reading sessions, Kilton Library provides healthy snacks, which are always a hit, and introduces families to its full range of resources beyond books, from movies and music to video games like The Dragon series. "We want the kids and parents to know the library is so much more than they might expect."

Kilton Library is also considering a similar program for older adults at Crafts Hill, potentially offering a book group or informal social hour. "Isolation can be so damaging," Celeste says. "Programs like these remind us that we all have more in common than we might think."

Through partnerships like this, Kilton Library and Twin Pines are creating a welcoming, supportive environment where residents feel at home. "A library really is the living room of the community," Celeste reflects. "We want Twin Pines residents to know they're always welcome here."

BUILDING A BRIGHTER FUTURE: Three New Housing Projects Completed in 2024

Twin Pines Housing is proud to announce the completion of three critical housing developments in 2024:

747 Hartford Avenue, Mountainvale Apartments, and Riverwalk Apartments. Together, these projects provide 100 affordable units to address pressing housing needs in the Upper Valley, offering new opportunities for individuals and families.



💫 Mountainvale Apartments, White River Junction, VT

In May 2024, Twin Pines completed the transformation of the former Fairfield Inn in White River Junction into Mountainvale Apartments. This project created 40 onebedroom and studio units, including eight units reserved for households experiencing or at risk of homelessness and four designated for veterans.

Located across from the VA Medical Center, Mountainvale Apartments provides convenient access to essential services for veterans and others in need. The project exemplifies Twin Pines' ability to re-purpose existing properties into safe, high-quality housing.



Located in White River Junction, VT, 747 Hartford Avenue provides 18 permanently affordable one-bedroom units for chronically homeless individuals. Built on land previously owned by St. Paul's Church, this project reflects Twin Pines Housing's mission to support the most

The building's location, next to the Upper Valley Haven, ensures residents have access to vital support services, including employment counseling, financial guidance, and mental health care. Residents are selected through the State of Vermont's coordinated entry system, which is locally

B Riverwalk Apartments, White River Junction, VT

Also completed in May 2024, Riverwalk Apartments brings 42 affordable multi-family units to White River Junction. Located at the corner of Maple and Prospect Streets, the energy-efficient building offers residents easy access to schools, grocery stores, parks, and public transportation.

In addition to its prime location, Riverwalk Apartments features large, comfortable units, ample parking, and scenic views of the Connecticut River and surrounding areas. Its proximity to the LISTEN Community Service Center supports food security for residents, further enhancing their quality of life.



These three projects reflect Twin Pines Housing's ongoing dedication to providing safe, affordable homes for the Upper Valley. By addressing homelessness, supporting veterans, and increasing access to essential services, these developments are building hope—and a stronger community—for all.
